6. St. George Island Bathrooms—The TDC Board approved recommending the pursuit of a loan which would fund the project's new construction (SGI Bathrooms). The loan would be paid annually with the allowable 10% currently budgeted.

TDC Recommendation: Board action to authorize the TDC to pursuit a loan as funding for the SGI Bathroom new construction project. This loan will be repaid from allowable TD budgeted funds.

Action Item(s)

24. I have seven resolutions for adoption on unanticipated revenues as part of the end-ofthe-fiscal year bookkeeping. These funds were not included in your original adopted budget because at the time they were unanticipated. All funds have been spent. Approval is needed to comply with Florida Statute 129 to incorporate these funds into your 18/19 budget. The 1 st resolution is \$173,894 received from the Florida Tourism Industry Marketing Corporation for Visit Florida promotional activities. The 2 nd resolution is \$20,557 received from the Florida Department of Health for payment of expenses relative to pesticide purchases for the prevention of the Zika Virus. The 3 rd resolution is \$139,100 in insurance proceeds received from the Florida League of Cities for the repairs made to equipment at the County Jail after a lightning strike. The 4 th resolution is \$11,000 received from Duke Energy relative to providing storage for sea oats as part of the Sea Oat Restoration Project. The 5 th resolution is \$46,195 received from State and Federal FEMA funds relative to the storm damage repairs made to the Indian Creek Boat Ramp. The 6 th resolution is \$48.264 received from the Florida Department of Education by the Franklin County Sheriff's Department. These funds were used to pay expenditures relative to the School Guardian Program. The 7th resolution is \$52,432 received from the Big Bend Mental Health Program by the Franklin County Sheriff's Department. The funds were used to pay expenditures relative to that program at the Sheriff's Department.

25. For action: the Finance Department needs the following budget amendments and resolutions approved to amend the last year's budget. The resolutions incorporate unanticipated revenues into your last year's budget. These revenues were unanticipated and spent during the past fiscal year – the revenues were not included in the original budget because it was not known that the revenue would be received when the budget was originally adopted. Approval is needed to comply with Florida Statute 129. The budget amendments move budgeted values from one line item to another.

RESTORE Coordinator - Alan Pierce - Report

Action Item(s)

26. Board action for the Mr. Shuler, County Attorney, to negotiate an amendment to Mr. Pete Burgher's existing lease at the airport. Mr. Burgher, with the county's permission, built a hanger at his own expense about 20 years ago, and entered into a land lease for the property the hanger occupies. Mr. Burgher currently pays \$1520 a year in a land lease. At the end of the current lease the hanger will convert to the county, but Mr. Burgher would like to donate the hanger to the county now, and then increase his payments so that he would pay a hanger and a land lease. Mr. Burgher is 80 years old and would like to do this so that in the event of something happening to him the hanger, which he currently owns, does not get tied up in probate and estate problems. He is proposing to pay \$300 per month, which is more than double what he currently pays, and would like to extend his lease by 5 years from Dec. 31, 2019. I have spoken to Jason Puckett, Airport Manager, and Centric Aviation, and they both support the proposal.

Board action to direct Mr. Shuler to negotiate a lease amendment with Mr. Burgher.

Information Item(s)

- 27. Inform the Board that FWC has been awarded a \$20M grant from the Gulf Environmental Benefit Fund for Apalachicola Bay Oyster Reef Restoration, Phase II. I spoke to Mr. Jim Estes, FWC senior staff, and received the following details. This is a 5 year project of which the first two years will be working with the FSU oyster project, funded through TRIUMPH, to determine where and how to start rebuilding the oyster bars. In years, 3, 4 and 5, FWC will be placing oyster substrate in the Bay. The goal is to rebuild up to 1000 acres of oyster reef. (The Phase I of this project occurred a few years ago where FWC rebuilt about 300 acres of oyster bars.)
- 28. Inform the Board that the Apalachicola RiverKeepers has been awarded a \$5M grant from the Gulf Environmental Benefit Fund to improve three sloughs in the Apalachicola and Chipola Rivers. The Riverkeepers will be partnering with the Univ. of Florida and the Apalach. Nat. Estuarine Research Reserve (ANERR).
- 29. Inform the Board that Commissioner Parrish and I spoke last week and we understand that the Special Master appointed by the US Supreme Court has concluded his hearing in New Mexico regarding the Apalachicola River water wars and will make his finding by the end of the year. His finding will be submitted to the Court who should rule on this sometime in the spring term of the Court. We understand that the state of Florida changed its approach and argued that the farmers in southern Georgia should be limited in water use. Previously Florida had argued that the City of Atlanta needed to limit its water use.
- 30. Inform the Board that Representative Shoaf announced on television last week that he intended to submit a bill in the upcoming legislative session for funds to build a new EOC in Franklin County. The Board may recall that a new EOC was ranked as the county's number one priority.
- 31. Inform the Board that Centric Aviation and I met twice with TRIUMPH staff last week to work on the fuel farm and back-up generator upgrade at the airport. As the Board may

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recall, the county has requested \$1M for a new fuel farm and back-up generator so that the airport can be prepared for any future hurricanes where the airport would serve as a mega-center for hurricane recovery. The county has applied for funds saying that the improvements would provide improved hurricane response for the region. TRIUMPH staff has asked us to re-visit the project as a certification/training opportunity. The idea is to use the airport as a training center in conjunction with the various drone programs that are already funded in the school systems of Franklin, Gulf, and Wakulla counties. Centric Aviation would play a role in the certification process and it is possible TRIUMPH would increase the grant award to pay Centric for its effort in providing certifications. We are still working on this request from TRIUMPH staff so even though there is a TRIUMPH Board meeting here tomorrow our project is not on the agenda.

32. Inform the Board I had written a letter of support months ago for a proposal written by FCMC for a study of alternatives to protecting Alligator Drive and Point properties other than through standard beach renourishment. Ms. Sara Kelty, with FCMC, submitted the project to an organization called the North Gulf Sentinel Site Cooperative, which is a partnership between the Missisippi and Alabama Sea Grant Consortium, who had received some BP funds. After months of review the Cooperative contacted FCMC and said they liked the project but did not have enough funds for the whole project, so the Cooperative on their own initiative had reached out to FDEP for assistance. FDEP has provided the remaining funds through a FDEP Resilience Planning Grant.

The total funding for this study is \$59,920, with it split between the Cooperative and FDEP. The project will explore what other options are available to make a community more resilient to flooding and erosion, and to produce a video of the effort.

- 33. Board updates from the last meeting.
 - A) Commissioner Parrish had asked Mr. Moron to contact Mr. John Collins, AVCON, for an update on the construction of the airport access road. I ended up speaking with Mr. Collins. AVCON and the road contractor have reached an agreement on price, and construction should start in December. The hold-up was not over price, but over a permitting requirement from the Northwest Florida Water Management District. AVCON did not want to issue a Notice to Proceed and put the contractor on the clock until all the permit issues had been cleared up.
 - B) I had sent an email out to the commissioners the day after the last meeting advising that I had received an email from FCMC saying that FEMA had agreed to let the county proceed with rebuilding Alligator Drive as one project. I then was copied on an email from Senator Rubio's office saying that FEMA was going to set up a follow-up meeting with the county to discuss the project. That meeting has not been scheduled yet. Mr. Clay Kennedy, Dewberry, has contacted Anderson Columbia to make sure that their bid is still good, because we are beyond the 60 day window where some bids are no longer valid because of cost increases. Since the bid was announced, Tropical Storm Nestor did minor damage to the road base so before Anderson Columbia responds to the inquiry about their bid they were going to investigate the road to make sure the conditions were the same as what they bid on. We all understand the asphalt is gone, but that was going to be removed by the contractor so that is not a substantial change.
- 34. Discussion of my future plans. The Board has authorized Mr. Moron to make certain personnel changes to increase his administrative capabilities. Those changes will allow some of my Board responsibilities to migrate to this new position so at this time I am not going to recommend another consultant to replace me. I am here to assist the Board but I think it is prudent to see what capabilities are generated by Mr. Moron's changes before

the Board hires another consultant. And, using this report as an example, it would be very difficult to hire a consultant to develop this kind of report. This comes from years of contact on behalf of the county, and many of these items are better performed in-house.

County Coordinator - Michael Morón - Report

Action Item(s)

- 35. Living Shoreline/Franklin-98: I received a request from Mr. Josh Adams of ARPC for a letter of support for the Living Shoreline project, now known as Franklin-98, for the next phase of the project. The deadline for the letter of support was Monday, November 11th. Since the Board has stated its support for this project and has participated in the first inter-agency and public meetings, I created the letter and got the Chairman's signature.
 - **Staff Recommendation:** Board action to ratify the Chairman's signature on the letter of support for the next phase of the Franklin-98 Living Shoreline project.
- 36. CR 67 Sidewalk Project: At you last meeting the Board authorized staff to start negotiations with Dewberry Engineers, the number one ranked firm, for Construction Engineering and Inspections (CEI) services for County Road 67 (Tallahassee Street) FDOT LAP funded sidewalk project. Staff has received the signed contract and Notice to Proceed from FDOT; therefore, the next step would be to advertise for a contractor to build the sidewalk.
 - **Staff Recommendation:** Board action to authorize staff to advertise for a contractor to build the sidewalk.
- 37. SHIP HHRP Funds: The application submission period for the Hurricane Housing Recovery Program has ended. Mrs. Lori Switzer your SHIP administrator reported that she received 7 home repair applications and 35 replacement/repair mobile home applications. The 7 home repair applications are below the percentage, based on \$50,000 maximum per house, stated on the delivery goals chart that we submitted to the state for approval. Mrs. Switzer has contacted the state and received a waiver to spend the remaining program funds, after repairing the 7 homes on the list, on mobile homes. She also requested additional funds since there were so many mobile home applications but was told that the county would not receive any additional HHRP funds. Mrs. Switzer is asking if there should be a hazard insurance requirement for homeowners that receive replacement mobile homes. The Board ultimately didn't include this requirement for those receiving homes as part of the Eastpoint Fire victims CDBG grant.

Staff Recommendation: Board discussion and direction, by motion, on hazard insurance requirement for HHRP replacement mobile homes

Information Item(s)

- 38. FDOT 5-year Work-plan: At your October 15th meeting I stated that FDOT published their tentative 2021-2025 work plan that included Franklin County projects. Since the work plan's public hearing, there have been changes that affect Franklin County projects. I have informed AVCON, the Airport Engineer firm, and Mr. Puckett your Airport Manager. I have attached a copy of the FDOT notice to my report.
- 39. Jail & Medical Report: The Sheriff has submitted the 2019 Jail and Medical report. I have attached the Summary Page that indicates it was a good inspection. Let me know if you would prefer an electronic or paper copy of the entire report for your review, I will submit the original copy of the report to the Clerk.

- 40. Armory Website: On June 18th the Board, based on my request, authorized the County's website vendor to create a website that would promote the Fort Coombs Armory as a wedding, event, and convention center destination for the county, that would be paid by the Tourist Development Council. At that time, it was my anticipation that the installation of the sprinkler system would have been halfway if not totally completed. Since the county is still in the process of securing funds for this project, I have put this project on hold. As soon as funding is secured, and the installation has started, I will revisit this project.
- 41. Bay City Workcamp: Inform the Board that the Sheriff may be using the value of the Bay City Workcamp for matching funds as part of two legislative appropriations applications that were sent to the house and the senate last week. I forwarded the Sheriff's request for a valuation to Attorney Shuler for an amount; however, the county doesn't have a valuation amount of the property and buildings that are being transferred to the Sheriff.
- 42. Weems Healthcare Public Hearing: The Weems Board of Directors held a public hearing on Thursday, November 14th to receive comments from the public regarding the future of health care in Franklin County. Mr. David Walker, Weems CEO, has created a report (attached) that summarizes the comments of each speaker and emails from residents that were unable to attend.






Apalachicola River Slough Restoration - Phase I


This project will restore the connection of three slough systems in the Apalachicola River watershed. River sloughs are important in transporting freshwater to floodplains and in controlling the storage and release of freshwater and nutrients into the river and ultimately to Apalachicola Bay. Due to past alterations sloughs have filled with sediment, severing the connection between the river and receiving areas fed by the sloughs resulting in a reduction in nutrient transmission and flow that negatively affects downstream habitat quality. This project will dredge sediment and re-establish hydrologic connectivity through three river sloughs. In addition to restoring three sloughs, the project will also develop an Apalachicola River Slough Restoration Plan to further assess current conditions and quantify the benefits of implementing large-scale slough restoration in the lower Apalachicola River system.

The Apalachicola Watershed and Bay are identified as priority conservation areas in the Florida GEBF Restoration Strategy. Project goals also address restoration needs identified in multiple conservation plans. The Apalachicola Bay system is one of the most biologically diverse and important to fisheries in the southeastern United States. Completion of river slough restoration activities will improve freshwater flow into critical estuarine habitats, restore floodplain habitat, and increase fisheries productivity in the Apalachicola Bay.



GEBF funds will restore sloughs within the Apalachicola River pictured below. The graphic to the left shows a diagram of a typical floodplain cross section and the sediment that will be removed to restore floodplain hydrology.

Dear Sheriff Smith,

On October 17, 2019, I conducted the Florida Model Jail Standards Jail and Medical inspections for your facility. I was greeted and welcomed by your staff.

After a brief entrance interview, I began my inspection with a review of Fire Marshal inspections, Health Department Kitchen inspections, Sanitation and Security logs, Weekly Inspection logs, and new Policies and Procedures. All were in order with the exception of Key Logs, which were not complete. Major Summerhill informed me that a sign in automatic key log will be purchased in the near future.

A review of Booking files indicated that all was in order. Property Room was neat and orderly. In the Laundry Room, locks have been put on the electrical boxes and the shelves of laundry were sufficient. In the Kitchen, cans and boxes were labeled and the area and utensils were clean. The walk in freezer had ice accumulated around the door and on the floor outside the freezer. Major Summerhill advised that Maintenance will be notified to check the freezer seals and lock. Housing areas were clean and neat. Inmates were quiet and calm.

The inspection of the Medical unit indicated that all was in order there. The handwashing sink has been installed, and I found all to be in order. Charts were neat and complete, with the exception of signatures of Booking Officers on the Intake Screening sheets. These must be signed by the inmate and the Booking Officer.

The facility is clean, quiet, and quite efficiently operated. I was welcomed and the staffs were most cooperative and friendly. The facility reflects the calm, efficient leadership which begins with the sheriff. It was a pleasure to conduct these inspections, and reports have been transmitted electronically to Major Summerhill. If you have questions or comments, please feel free to advise me. Thank you for this opportunity. Again, it was a pleasure.

The public hearing was called to order at 5:30. Board members in attendance were Duffie Harrison, Kristin Anderson, Doug Creamer, Donnie Gay, and Myrtis Wynn.

COMMENT #1

- No changes with the Alliant proposal
- Alliant has a management fee.
- Sacred Heart could offer affordable health care with financial backing.

COMMENT #2

- Nowhere in Alliant contract is there a mention of TMH.
- Do we have an offer in writing from TMH to provide all services provided on spreadsheet?
- Do we have a contract with TMH?

COMMENT #3

- Why would we be interested in aligning ourselves with Sacred Heart when they are in the red?
- Concerned for patients of hospital and clinic who do not have transportation.
- Need to keep the hospital local and accessible, unless we are prepared to provide transportation.

COMMENT #4

- Years ago, our hospital went into a contract with company that managed both the Port St Joe and Apalachicola hospitals. When the company abruptly left Apalachicola, a lot of Weems equipment went to Port St. Joe. Why would we want to go through that again?
- The question is, where do you plan to get healthcare, in Port St. Joe or Tallahassee? Are the people who live here going to support and use health care services in Port St. Joe?

COMMENT #5

- Worked in 2 critical access hospitals; both are now closed. One hospital went with a larger hospital and it still closed within 3 years.
- Alliant proposal raised a lot of red bells.
- Sacred Heart promised a 20-year commitment. I wholeheartedly support Sacred Heart.

COMMENT #6

- Sacred Heart has a history of supporting rural areas and hospitals. They funnel income from more profitable, urban hospitals to support rural hospitals. That is part of their mission. Because of the specificity of their proposal, we need to take them seriously.
- The Alliant proposal offered support, but not much else.
- Would like to see a more centrally located facility.
- Comparison with TMH is unfair. (Ms. Parmenas discussed surgical care at Weems without anesthesiology. She mistook general med/surg to mean surgery services.)

COMMENT #7

- Taking hospital away from community would endanger many lives.
- Many visitors will not choose this area if Apalachicola does not have a hospital.
- If Weems is given to Sacred Heart, it will be closed within 2 years.
- The county will lose residents. Don't give the hospital away.

COMMENT #8

- Want Weems to maintain full service
- Critical Access designation is something Sacred Heart wants to obtain.
- Concerned about Sacred Heart's losses

COMMENT #9

• Wouldn't be standing here today if Weems had not saved his life

COMMENT #10

- In support of Weems. Friend has been at Weems for 6 months. Weems has worked exhaustively to find a way to place her.
- What would happen to indigent, handicapped, elderly without Weems?
- Very important to residents and visitors to area. Having to travel to Port St Joe makes no sense in a thriving community.
- Has anyone done an impact study to determine domino effect of job loss if Sacred Heart took Weems?

COMMENT #11

- Once a deal is signed with Alliant, then Alliant will do a thorough evaluation within 2 months, followed by a board retreat. Sacred Heart has already studied what is going on in panhandle.
- Sacred Heart's proposal offers details, while Alliant's proposal does not.
- Wants to see upgraded equipment at Weems, which Sacred Heart could do

COMMENT #12

- Would not have husband with her today without Weems
- Impact of Sacred Heart would be job loss
- Having a hospital in the area is important. ER is especially important.
- Feels Sacred Heart only wants CAH designation
- We have all paid taxes for a new hospital, and we need to build the hospital

Worked at TMH for 15 years and feels it would be a mistake to turn back on TMH

COMMENT #14

• Distance is important when a child is having allergic reaction.

COMMENT #15

- Feels we need to cut losses. TMH has not done anything for us.
- Poor physician recruitment abilities
- Does not have confidence in county commission
- Using depreciation to pay for hospital loan would be playing with numbers. Will have cash flow for few years, then as depreciation decreases, how will we pay for new hospital?
- Everything seen from Sacred Heart looks good. If we don't partner with them, they will cannibalize Weems. They will continue to refer Sacred Heart clinic patients to Sacred Heart hospital.

COMMENT #16

• Both Alliant and Sacred Heart did not include the ambulance service in proposal. Would be wise to address. Essential part of question.

COMMENT #17

- Feels if hospital built, needs to be centrally located
- Feels cannot afford to build a hospital, need instead to have a new ER that is centrally located
- Sacred Heart is willing to bring in new equipment.
- Feels Sacred Heart would be hiring staff out of Weems because no housing available for new people.

- Sacred Heart in its proposal and Q and A indicated the county insurance would be accepted.
- The Weems Memorial Board does not have the skill set or experience to run a full-service hospital nor how to go about managing the challenges of the current state of Healthcare. Sacred Heart has this experience. It too shares a similar mission to that of the Weems Board including sustainability and serving those in our community who are least able to afford care.
- Sacred Heart's proposal projected losing money for the first three years, this belies the notion that Sacred Heart is only seeking to acquire the County's critical access money.
- Sacred Heart committed to a lease with the County for whatever time period. When pressed by BOCC, a term of 20 years was acceptable.
- The full-service hospital, particularly in small, rural communities, is a failing and outdated model. Sacred Heart offers the best option to bring up-to-date health care services, and economically viable options for these services, to Franklin County.

COMMENT #40

- People opposed to Weems remaining open have not had a loved one's life hanging in the balance. Weems Hospital is critically important.
- My mother is 77 years old and one of those people who avoid doctors and hospitals as much as
 possible. She had a condition that required her to spend the night in the hospital several years
 ago. She would not have gone to TMH or Bay Medical unless we restrained her and made her
 go.

COMMENT #41

- There are certain critical cases that arrive at Weems via ambulance or occasionally by private vehicle that are of such dire nature that the patient would likely not survive the further transit to Gulf County. Over the past 12 years I have treated a number of such cases, ranging from heart attacks, to strokes, to major trauma. I cannot accurately predict how may we might see in the coming year, nor can I assign any specific cost vs. benefit figures. I can flatly state that our particular geography often leaves Weems as a critical patient's last chance for stabilization or intervention prior to death.
- If a "stand-alone" ER is undertaken (as opposed to a hospital), the loss of monies attached to the capability for admitting and treating in-patients will render such a facility independently unsustainable. It would become quite the opposite of "stand-alone."
- If such a "stand-alone" facility failed, the county would be responsible for the costs of a significantly expanded EMS role, including additional vehicles, routine maintenance, insurance, operating, and personnel costs. We must remember that anyone may call an ambulance for anything, and now these calls would be all transported out of our county.

• I am in favor of building a new hospital as I feel we put the tax in place for a hospital and not an emergency room.

Weems has proven to be a literal life saver when lives have hung in the balance. Weems has provided in-patient care for so many of our residents who did not have any means of getting to and from another hospital. Those who live closest to the hospital would suffer the most if the hospital's inpatient care unit were lost.


We fully support Weems remaining open and viable in Apalachicola.
